BIGSSS Doctoral Colloquium

Summer Term 2025 Wednesday, 12:00-13:30, Conference Room (Unicom 7.3280)

As a required part of the BIGSSS curriculum, the Doctoral Colloquium aims to create a space for constructive discussion of ongoing work in progress and to get feedback from peers and faculty members. It follows the following structure:

- Presentation by a fellow (25 minutes max!)
- 5-minute discussion in marble groups of 2 (immediately after the presentation)
- Plenary discussion among all participants (in the spirit of "critical friends", Fellows first!)
- Discussant commentary on the paper (faculty member or postdoc, not supervisor)

Each Fellow should **present ongoing work** once a semester, but at least once a year. Presentations should be taken seriously, i.e. they should **not exceed 25 minutes** and be prepared with the aim of convincing critical friends! The presentation is based on a chapter or a paper that the Fellow is currently working on (this can also be a paper that is currently being revised etc.). This work is circulated among the Colloquium participants one week prior to the presentation. Work in progress is perfectly acceptable! In the rare case that there is no written text, the presentation must be circulated one week in advance.

Immediately after the presentation, participants get together in **marble groups** and collect questions for the presenter for 5 minutes. The first **general round of discussion** will then start fellows' questions and comments generated in the marble groups. The purpose of the colloquium is to improve each other's work – comments should be made in the spirit of constructive criticism. Be supportive, but also point to blank spots others – who might be less friendly – might address.

At the end, a **discussant** comments on the paper and, if possible, synthesizes the discussion points raised. The discussant is chosen a few weeks before the meeting together with the instructor.
